48 members from all corners of the state attended and spent 3 days sharing stories, laughs, and federation news! We can't wait to return in the Spring!









Scholarship Recipients Update:

At the Spring Convention in April, the GFWC-WS Scholarship Committee selected 6 scholarship winners and 2 alternates. To date, only 3 scholarships have been paid out. After tracking down the remaining 3 awardees, it was determined that one recipient has taken a break from school, and is waiting for acceptance to start college in January, one required a new claim form to update, and one chose an out-of-state college, and is therefore unable to accept the award.

Erin Trantham, sponsored by the GFWC Camas-Washougal Woman's Club has relinquished her \$1000 scholarship. First Alternate Krislyn Koler, sponsored by GFWC Chewelah Woman's Club will be accepting a \$500 scholarship in her place.

Alternate award winners receive no more than the last place scholarship award (which was \$500). Any remaining/unpaid funds will roll over for use in 2019. All scholarships must be claimed by December 31st. We are working with these remaining 3 recipients to meet this deadline.

Community Service Programs...CSP's



<u>Advocates</u> <u>for Children</u> Kathie Jorgensen

In 1998, Advocates for Children was selected as the GFWC Juniors' Special Project focus, and since then clubs have tackled issues such as child abuse, teen dating violence, depression and suicide, foster care and adoption, and more.

GFWC has a long history of child advocacy, including work towards preventing child labor, supporting proper health care for mothers and their babies, and establishing public libraries and kindergartens. Add to the legacy with your club's projects!

If your club didn't decide on a project, it's not too late. Read the <u>Juniors' Special</u> <u>Program</u> section of the GFWC Club Manual for a wealth of ideas for how you can make a difference in a child's life.

Please consider these statistics: Each year in the United States 700 women <u>die</u> from pregnancy-related causes and more than 50,000 have a near-miss (nearly-die) from severe complications from labor and childbirth. The U.S. is one of the most dangerous places in the developing world to give birth. <u>This is simply unacceptable.</u>

The nation's rate of preterm birth—the largest contributor to infant death in the United States -- increased again in 2016, after nearly a decade of decline, earning the nation a "C" grade on the latest March of Dimes Premature Birth Report Card.

The rate of preterm birth rose in states across the country for a second year in a row. More than 380,000 babies are born preterm in the U.S. each year, facing a greater likelihood of death before their first birthday, lifelong disabilities or chronic health conditions. An additional 8,000 babies were born prematurely in 2016 due to the increase in the preterm birth rate between 2015 and 2016.

The March of Dimes says: "The 2017 March of Dimes Report Card demonstrates that moms and babies in this country face a higher risk of preterm birth based on race and zip code," says Stacey D. Stewart, president of the March of Dimes. "We see that preterm birth rates worsened in 43 states plus the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico, and among all racial/ethnic groups. This is an unacceptable trend that requires immediate attention."

"The March of Dimes is dedicated to giving every baby a fair chance for a healthy start in life, and our work is more vital than ever," Ms. Stewart says.

The U.S. preterm birth rate went up from 9.6 percent of births in 2015 to 9.8 percent in 2016, according to final data from the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS). Across the country, black women are 49 percent more likely to deliver preterm compared to white women and American Indian/Alaska Native women are 18 percent more likely to deliver preterm compared to white women.

Premature birth (before 37 weeks of pregnancy) is the largest contributor to the death of babies in the U.S. Babies who survive an early birth often face serious and lifelong health problems, including breathing problems, jaundice, vision loss, cerebral palsy and intellectual delays. In addition to the human toll, preterm birth accounts for more than \$26 billion annually in avoidable medical and societal costs, according to the National Academy of Medicine.

"In addition to discovering new ways to prevent premature birth, and improve the care that women receive, it's essential that we improve the broader social context for health," says Paul E. Jarris, MD, MBA, chief medical officer of the March of Dimes. "Only then will our nation be able to level the playing field for mothers and babies in every community."

Advancement Areas

- LEADS -Leadership, Education, and Development Seminar Turning today's clubwomen into tomorrow's leaders.

In 2001 GFWC conceived the idea to begin a training program for leaders. Today, over 800 "future" leaders have gone through the LEADS training and many are now serving in leadership roles for their clubs, districts, states and even GFWC.

Since the inception of the program, GFWC Washington State has proudly sponsored a candidate at each of the Seminars. If you yourself, or if you feel there is a member in your club or district who has great leadership potential and is interested in pursuing additional federation leadership opportunities, LEADS may be a perfect fit. The application process is simple. Complete the LEADS Application Form and send it to Carlene Garner, GFWC-WS Leadership Chairman along with two letters of recommendations

GFWC suggests the following criteria for those interested in applying for this "one in a life time adventure." The Seminar is held on the day prior to the opening of the GFWC Convention.

- Demonstrates leadership capabilities at the club level as an active club president, club officer, or club project or committee chairman
- Exhibits a commitment to the Federation
- Exhibits an understanding of the GFWC mission of community service, illustrated by programs and projects in which she is or has been involved
- Demonstrates leadership skills, including, but not limited to, organization, responsibility, trustworthiness, enthusiasm, and flexibility
- Exhibits an interest in and willingness to pursue higher leadership positions in GFWC
- Agrees to share information gained from participation in LEADS with others in the state federation
- Understands and accepts potential expenses involved in participation
- Has not held elected positions at or beyond the state level (this criterion is recommended to encourage potential leaders at the club level to apply)
- Has not attended a previous LEADS program. Members are eligible to attend only once

For the selected candidate, GFWC will cover a portion of the attendees' expenses, including:

- Stipend of \$250 for travel
- Lodging allowance of half of the double room rate for two nights at the Convention hotel
- Breakfast and lunch during the LEADS program
- Checks will be distributed to candidates upon attendance and completion of the seminar.

Women's History & Resource




A couple of our History's Accomplishments: In the 1922 GFWC purchased our Headquarters at 1734 N Street; GFWC founded 75% of all U.S. Public Librarioes according to the American Library Association and one more thing for this addition, in 1942; through GFWC "Buy a Bomber" Campaign during World War II, members raised \$154,459,132 through the sale of war bonds – enough money to purchase 431 planes – no wonder we are so proud of all of our members, especially those that have gone before us, they sacrified so much to make this happen.

Paulette Stinson, Columbia District President, led the meeting and shared helpful tips on well run meetings.




District Fall Conferences



GFWC Battle Ground - Lady Bug Bazaar

Ladybug Bazaar bigger than ever

GFWC-Battle Ground's Ladybug Bazaar saw shoppers start lining up a half hour before the doors were opened. This primary



fundraiser for the club has been continuous since 1967 and has grown from 12 tables in a social hall to 189 tables (spaces) in two adjoining gyms and a mezzanine above one.



A substantial club money-maker at the Ladybug Bazaar is it's kitchen menu. Members rotate shifts. This crew included a high school student, an exchange student and an "almost" member. 
