Greetings from GFWC-WS President Betty ~

The GFWC-WS Convention was held in Yakima, April 26 – 28. We had 61 members in attendance. Trisha Shafer, GFWC Director of Junior clubs was our special guest. We started the weekend with our Women in Military project (the tattered flag project) and we wrote 54 cards for cancer patients.

During the weekend, awards were presented by the program chairman. We celebrated our GFWC-WS Clubwoman of the year, Karen Smith, and our GFWC-WS LEADS candidate, Sandra Groves. We were able to give \$3,000 in educational scholarships, with three \$1,000 scholarships being provided.

Our members donated to the Endowment Funds. Jeanette Jester reported for Linda Butcher, GFWC-WS Endowment trustee, that "The World is Ours" fund has collected \$3,415. In addition, members brought 107 Dr. Seuss Books in support of the GFWC Grand initiatives.

Our lunchtime speaker was Eliza Penick from Heifer. We heard about a number of projects, including "milk for children" (just a \$72 donation will give milk to a child for a year). Members also supported my special project, Relay for Life by donating \$135. And we had the "Art Parade", in which the favorite art was shown to the members and winners received money from Coins for Art donations.

Our evening speaker was Trisha Shafer who gave a motivational GFWC speech. Then we held a fun reception to honor Trisha, with Girl Scout cookies for a treat. Sunday morning brought a Frozen motivation from Jeanette Jester.

Our final presentation, from Ginger Bowman-Rape, on Domestic Violence Awareness and Prevention, provided serious statistics, serious things to consider and a round of singing.

Fundraising over the weekend included 50/50, club craft projects, and a raffle. We raised \$989 from these activities. Thanks to all the GFWC-WS members for attending Convention and for supporting all the GFWC-WS projects.



Seattle Children's Hospital Vintage Fashion Show Benefit 'All Along the Homefront WWII'

On Saturday, March 16, 2019 from 1pm to 4pm, the GFWC Capital Woman's Club in partnership with the Seattle Children's Olympia Bargain Boutique hosted a fundraising event to benefit the Uncompensated Care Fund for Seattle Children's Hospital. The Uncompensated Care Fund is a key program that insures every child receives world class medical care, regardless of their ability to pay. It also allows parents to focus and care for their child without worrying about medical bills. The uniqueness of this program is that it covers not only residents of the state of Washington, but also throughout the United States, as well as, Worldwide. Because of this, members of GFWC Capital Woman's Club have decided to make this extremely important and worthy cause a yearly event.

The Vintage Fashion Show was held at the Washington Center for Performing Arts in downtown Olympia, WA. This benefit became a reality after club member Deborah Peterson won the opportunity of a one day free rental use by the City of Lacey. The benefit was chaired by Virginia Sablan and Deborah, fulfilling Virginia's vision for the much needed Uncompensated Care Fund for the Seattle Children's Hospital. Participants of the show were Tumwater's own Don Trosper of the Olympia Tumwater Foundation who was the show's emcee and provided unique historical commentary during the show, Chris Schultz of the Seattle Children's Olympia Bargain Boutique who provided commentary about the Uncompensated Care Fund, Seattle Children's Fashion Show models who modeled vintage WWII fashions and military wear, and Lacy Rodriguez as 'Rosie the Riveter' who presented the 'we can do it' attitude that was so important not only to the WWII's cause, but also to Seattle Children's Hospital Uncompensated Care Fund.'s cause

The Vintage Fashion Show included lunch for the patrons which was prepared by members of GFWC Capital Woman's Club and consisted of finger sandwiches, fresh fruit, cookies, coffee, tea and water. There was an amazing array of Silent Auction items that club members made during workout sessions and which were available to bid on during the Show. The Vintage Fashion Show was attended by 65 patrons (59 paid and 6 complementary) and raised a total of \$2,520.71 (ticket sales, Silent Auction proceeds and cash donations). This fundraiser event was the largest event with the largest donation to date for GFWC Capital Woman's Club and was a very valuable learning experience for club members. Post event praiseworthy compliments provided by attending patrons, presenters and staff of the Washington Center for Performing Arts was a testament to the hard work done by the members of GFWC Capital Woman's Club.

Woman's Club of Olympia

In January, Linda Wolfe, Pat Keith and Sandra Groves met with Senator Sam Hunt in his office to review procedures and processes for potential funds from the Washington State Legislature for the Abigail Stuart House. The House, its upkeep and maintenance is a considerable cost to the Club and the Olympia Woman's Club has been looking to locate potential avenues of assistance. At the prompting of Senator Hunt, The Woman's Club of Olympia prepared an application to their Washington State Legislature House and Senate representatives, Senator Hunt and Representative Beth Doglio, to apply for an appropriation of funds from the Capital Budget for upgrades and maintenance of the historic Abigail Stuart House by making it more ADA accessible, upgrading the electrical wiring system, installing a new roof, refinishing floors, painting, and overall maintenance of the House. This application made it through the offices its Sponsors Hunt and Doglio to be included as an application to the Financial Committee. Since March 1st, the Club periodically checked in with Hunt and Doglio's offices and reviewed the progress of its application.

The final vote on the Washington State Operating and Capital Budgets was held just moments before the close of the legislative session and both budgets passed with revisions. One revision that was not removed was the Abigail Stuart House and the final Capital Budget awarded an appropriation in the amount of \$250,000. The Woman's Club of Olympia is thrilled with this outcome and will be setting up a committee to set priorities for the use of the funds within the guidelines of the application.

It would be a choir director's dream to be invited into a piano shop, allowed to play every baby grand on the floor and then, with a snap of your fingers, have the one with the very best sound delivered to your high school as a gift. This is exactly what happened to Bryce Pollock, the choir director for Kalama High School, thanks to the efforts of AMALAK, Kalama's hard-working philanthropic woman's group, and *Envision Kalama*, the action group dedicated to funding projects and activities for the betterment of Kalama.

They say it takes a village and this is certainly true in Kalama. The school had a piano but every time it had to be moved (which was often) it fell out-of-tune. What they really needed was a baby grand, which is not only a superior instrument but one that will hold its tune better under the rigorous demands of both high school and middle school choirs. It isn't hard to imagine that a piano is something low on the priority list when compared with necessities like classrooms and science labs. So, Pollock began his quest for a piano upgrade by reaching out to Marcia LeFevre, President of AMALAK and Mary Putka, Secretary of *Envision Kalama*, to see if they could offer any assistance.

"Purchasing a baby grand piano was a little rich for either group to tackle on its own," Marcia LeFevre explained. "But this is exactly the type of challenge that we get up in the morning to meet head on."

Within weeks a baby grand piano with a lush sound was located, tested, found worthy and reserved. Collectively, AMALAK, *Envision Kalama* and the *United Methodist Women* came together and pooled funds to purchase the piano, a dolly, delivery, set up, tuning and a five-year warranty.

On February 21, 2019, the school became the proud owner of a Chickering baby grand piano.





- •One nominee may be nominated from each club.
- •Nominee must be a member in good standing of GFWC clubs for a minimum of 5 years.
- •Nominations should emphasize a member's entire lifetime of service.
- •Clubs must complete and submit the official GFWC Jennie Award Nomination Form (which is fillable on line) along with a maximum 500 word written narrative. Please include club activities, community groups and commitment to family.
- •Provide no more than 25 pages of supportive material, which includes the title-page, nomination form and narrative.

Clubs can submit nomination material to Betty MacMaster, GFWC-WS President, postmarked by June 1, 2019 for state-level judging.

We have so many deserving women in Washington State that each club should consider nominating a member of their club for this outstanding award.

Ladies, it's time to start thinking about officers for the GFWC-WS 2020-2022 Administration. While it is a year away, there are some things you need to do before then. Being a GFWC-WS officer is a fun and exciting job. **Read the bylaws** in regards to the position that you wish to hold and the steps you need to take.
