
# Spring Convention & Installation 2020 ... at least how it happened!


Living the Volunteer Spirit

What an interesting time. Usually I would be reporting on our GFWC-WS Convention; however, due to COVID 19 (Coronavirus) we were unable to hold our Convention in Moses Lake. I do want to thank everyone who was working on this special event. Our GFWC-WS members did vote via email/phone/mail for our 2020 – 2022 GFWC Officers. Congratulations to all! Any additional business, including awards, will be completed at GFWC-WS Summer Planning or the Fall Board. We will be having a fun time too, for "It's a Small World" at Fall Board, so remember to bring your Mickey Ears.

In this newsletter we are including the winners of the GFWC-WS awards. Thanks to all the clubs for your volunteer work and to the chairpeople for writing reports and providing the list of award winners. For 2019, our state should be very proud about our 27 clubs, with 371 members, 1034 programs/projects, 39,675 Volunteer Hours, donations of \$140,469, and "in-kind donations of \$138,116.21. To support the Seven Grand Initiatives, we planted 13 trees, worked on 3 projects for Women in the Military, and donated 671 Pairs of shoes to Soles4Souls. We also donated 383 Dr. Seuss Books, and worked on 3 projects for Martin Luther King Day. Members supported my Special Project, Relay for Life, by participating in walks. Over 190 hours and \$1,556.50 dollars were given by clubs to their local Relays.

Thanks to all the GFWC-WS members for your work during 2019 and for supporting all the GFWC-WS projects.

Thank you for your support during this last two years. Thanks for all you are doing.

# Parliamentary Viewpoints

I have had some questions this spring regarding mail and email voting, as well as when new officers take office and assume their duties. This is a vastly different time for all of us. Even if your club or district has planned and have bylaws that allow electronic voting, it is hard to implement those rules if that issue has never been used. I am not sure the months ahead will get any easier when it comes to doing business. I would suggest we all get use to using our technology and make sure our parliamentary bases are covered.

Elections: For those of you who have voting by mail, email, or anything other than voting at a meeting (this must be in your bylaws in order to use either of these methods), your meeting minutes should show the date the votes were counted, the names of those counting the votes, how many members voted, and how many votes each candidate received.

As noted in a recent GFWC "News & Notes", you need to record any illegal or invalid ballots also. You then state that the President was given the results and that she declared the following to have been elected, giving their names.

Business: If you are holding club meeting via conference calls or visual software, you should make sure you have a quorum of members present on the call/visual meeting. The club cannot conduct official business without a quorum. If there is a motion having to do with club business being put before the membership, you need the name of the maker of the motion, the fact that it was seconded (doesn't hurt to include the name of the seconder since you can't necessarily see who it is) and the number of votes, both positive and negative, that were received. These need to be reflected in the minutes.

If this is a conference call, the person responding to the question should identify themselves as they discuss or vote, so the secretary can record the votes and make sure each member voted. On a Zoom meeting, or similar software, the member should make sure they are recognized as they vote so it can be properly recorded.

Just remember, not all our members can attend a visual meeting, and some do not use email. Many of our clubs will be going to, or are using, conference calls and visual calls for their meetings. This may have to be the case for months to come. A phone conference is the easiest. I would encourage each club to ask someone to help you get online so you can be able to conduct meetings with your club members. (If this Old Lady can do it, any of you can!!!)

As for taking office and assuming responsibilities, members are in office as soon as they are elected. However, it is not necessary for the officer to be sworn in or have an installation ceremony for her to begin her new job. Most clubs, district and state bylaws have, or should have, a statement when the newly elected officer assume their positions. With the absence of a State Convention or a GFWC Convention, the new officers can take their position on an agreed upon date with the outgoing and incoming administrations. This year the GFWC Installation would have taken place on June 30<sup>th</sup>. That is a good "official" date to assume the newest administration. However, new administrations need to initiate planning for the coming two years and can begin confirming their plans, appointments, etc. as soon as elected. They need to be respectful of the outgoing administration, so they can complete any unfinished activities from their administration.

Just remember, follow your bylaws. If they don't give you the guidance you seek with regard to the new technology that surrounds us, it is time to look at the bylaws and make changes as necessary. I'm here to help if you have questions. Stay safe and stay healthy.

### The GFWC-WS Scholarship Committee is honored to present our State's newest scholarship awardees for Spring 2020:

1st Place goes to Hailey Hamilton, sponsored by GFWC Battle Ground. She receives \$1500 from the General Scholarship Fund, plus \$1000 for the Kathy Estep Scholarship (for a total of \$2500). Hailey will be graduating this June with both her high school diploma and an Associate Degree in Pre-Nursing from Clark College. Hailey works part-time as a Certified Nursing Assistant as an in-home caregiver. She is a Corps Commander in the Air Force Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps; the highest position appointed by instructors. She plays on the school basketball team, is a member of the drill team, and has volunteered over 160 hours, all while maintaining a 3.8 GPA. With religion being an important part of her life, Hailey plans to study

**2nd Place to Claire McCray, Philomathic Club. She receives \$1300.** Claire is no stranger to challenges. Despite choosing mostly Honors and AP classes and participating in many extracurricular activities, she will be graduating high school with an impressive 4.0 GPA. This will serve her well on her goal to becoming a Biomedical Engineer, working on developing improved apparatuses for people with disabilities. This is something Claire has first-hand experience with, having had to deal with a physical disability since childhood. Raised in a rural setting, Claire is looking forward to broadening her horizons at the University of Washington.





### **3rd Place to Ruby Roebuck, Woman's Club of Olympia. She receives \$700.**

Ruby had a rough start to high school. She hated school, felt disconnected, struggled academically, and had a lot of self-doubt. Switching to an alternative school at the start of her sophomore year, Ruby discovered a caring and supportive environment which fostered a love for learning, discovering, critical thinking, and contributing. She stepped out of her comfort zone and with the encouragement of a teacher, applied for and was selected to be a member of the Lakefair Royal Court in Olympia. This year-long commitment exposed Ruby to volunteering, public speaking, and personal development. She is graduating with a 3.7 GPA and is looking forward to studying multiple disciplines at Western Washington University to create a career that integrates environmental preservation, public speaking, education and mental health.

**4th Place to Keerthana Thammana, GFWC Cascade Woman's Club. She receives \$700.** Keerthana loves learning. Enrolled in very challenging Honors and AP classes in Science, Math, English, History, Computer Science, and others, she maintains a 3.99 GPA. Since 6<sup>th</sup> grade, she has actively sought out extracurricular and volunteer activities that focused on STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math). Keerthana's family has lived in Washington State since she was a young child, but her family is still awaiting Permanent Residency status in the US, a process that can take over 10 years for immigrants of some countries to obtain. Because of this, Keerthana will have to pay out-of-state tuition and she us unable to seek employment in the US to help pay for her own tuition. She plans to attend the University of Washington and study Bioengineering.





**5th Place to Madison Krogh, Moses Lake Woman's Club. She receives \$500.** Madison has a passion for family and community connection. She grew up participating in a variety of sports and competitive dance, and found it to be a rewarding way to build character, friendships and work ethic. Now Madison is coaching young students in soccer, so they can discover these life skills too. She attends Eastern Washington University, working on becoming an elementary school teacher, and plans to teach in a small community somewhere in central Washington.

### 6th Place to Addyson Jones, GFWC Sokico Woman's Club. She receives \$500.

Addyson has consistently served on the Associated Student Body at her high school, actively participates in Young Life, she's been a varsity athlete in soccer, basketball and track and field, a member of the Auburn City Council and more! She is a leader with a 3.99 GPA. Addyson plans to study Mechanical Engineering at Washington State University. She is driven to succeed in a career field underrepresented by women.

We are thrilled to be able to offer scholarships to all applicants who applied, due the generous donations made to the Scholarship Funds, and because of very favorable market returns on the scholarship investments last year. *Thank you for your contributions to the funds and congratulations to all!* The applicants never cease to amaze us, and all are sure to continue being leaders for a life-time.

We are also proud to announce that the Scholarship Committee did not award all of the funds available to us this year. Remaining for distribution next year is \$4865.66 from the General Fund, along with \$1000 from the Kathy Estep Fund. We felt this was particularly important given the economic crisis plus the sudden drop in interest rates due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. Next year may be a particularly rough year financially speaking for investment funds, and for graduates. Therefore, we encourage Clubs and individuals to continue to donate to this very worthy program, so we can continue to help young women succeed for years to come.

Hi, all! - - I hope your advocacy efforts are going well. I'm sending this note to let you know how easy it can be to get a Letter to the Editor published. My letter below was published in the Opinion section of the Tacoma News Tribune on April 26th, and I'd love to see more LTEs reflecting your thoughts in papers in Washington and Oregon. You don't have to write more than a few paragraphs. Just check out the LTE requirements for your newspaper in advance so you know what word limits they impose.

### Published April 26th, 2020:

Seems like everyone is becoming a vaccine expert these days, especially when it comes to developing a vaccine for COVID-19. As dire as the need is for a COVID vaccine, we shouldn't lose sight of vaccines that are readily available. Imagine fighting this battle on two fronts – COVID and measles – and now imagine that you're in a developing nation in Africa or Southeast Asia and that battle could become all too real. Vaccinations which are funded in part by the U.S. save about 2.5 million children a year, and the partnerships forged with UNICEF, WHO, the CDC and GAVI The Vaccine Alliance are crucial in preventing breakouts of diseases like measles and polio. More importantly, the work these organizations have done in pioneering new vaccines will be critical to create and deliver a COVID vaccine.

The total budget for programs to eliminate measles, eradicate polio and fund GAVI is \$711 million – considering we've spent over \$2 trillion to combat COVID-19, that's a steal. I hope that each of us will reach out to our Members of Congress and ask them to fully fund global vaccine activities. It truly never has been more important to ensure the health of families everywhere.



So here is a snapshot of GFWC Columbia District during 2019.


The 7 Grand Initiatives: Almost 400 (392) pairs of shoes were donated to the Soles 4 Souls Project.

Nine members joined the Legislative Action Center. There were three very impressive projects commemorating Women in the Military. Nine trees were added to our local environment on Arbor Day, thanks to our clubwomen. Over forty Dr. Seuss books were donated to children in our district and statewide.

Monetary donations were sent to St. Jude's Childrens Research Hospital, March of Dimes, HOBY, Heifer International, Operation Smile, Shot @ Life, and to the US Fund for UNICEF.

This group of hard-working women were also big on fundraising! GFWC Columbia District Clubs reported fundraising a total of \$26,736.00 in 2019, with another \$1348.00 in in-kind donations. Volunteerism at its best! This is how we make a difference in our communities.

**GFWC Cascade Woman's Club** supported their community and families in many ways the past two years. Some of their projects were:


- Sammamish Symphony Orchestra they manage the concession stand and the ticketing.




