The purpose of this project was to give kids teddy bears during the first year of the Administration, and the handbags were to be distributed to women experiencing homelessness or other difficult situations. Clubwomen planned to fill the handbags with necessities such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, hairbrushes, and more. However, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, these projects could not be completed during 2020. Members will now be helping the teddy bears find their little human friends soon, and the handbags will hopefully give women in need a moment of happiness.

President Taylor decided in lieu of no in-person meetings, GFWC Washington would hold social Zoom meetings for members from the entire state. The meetings were enjoyed by clubwomen and very well attended. So far, GFWC Washington has held three social Zoom meetings, and members are considering continuing them even after in-person meetings start again.

<u>DAV (Disabled American Veterans):</u> "DAV is a strong and influential advocate for veterans, fighting on their behalf to ensure they receive the full range of services and protections they deserve, including Women Veterans." This is all done with donations. The Transportation Program provides free rides to VA Medical Centers for clinic visits; services such as grocery shopping, yard work and companionship are also provided. They are a fierce advocate for mental health care, run a National Disabled Winter Sports Clinic and can provide Disaster Relief funds.

United Service Organizations: "The USO provides programs and services to improve the quality of life of military service members and their families. There are more than 250 USO centers across the U.S. and around the world, all set to meet the needs of their specific military community."

The most well known may be the Free Phone Calls Home and Bob Hope Legacy Reading Program, in which service members record themselves reading a book for their children.

The family receives the recording and a copy of the book – What a remarkable gift!

"On Capitol Hill, DAV helps promote policies/legislation which ensure veterans and their families can live with respect and dignity." Researching the DAV site, I saw — and signed up for- virtual notifications concerning new bills that have been introduced to the U.S. Senate or House of Representatives that effect veterans. These are sent by Steven Whitehead, DAVA National Commander. The message states the bill, who introduced it, and the rationale. At the bottom of the page there is a button to click that reads, "Take Action" that will send your message regarding this bill to your U.S. Senator or Representative. DISPLAY QUILT FOR CATHERINE MONTGOMERY INTERPRETIVE CENTER


Federation Forest Committee and Membership Chairman, Lynn Cline, received permission for GFWC-WS to display a quilt on a wall in the Catherine Montgomery Interpretive Center. The Federation Forest Committee, Membership Committee and Environment Chairman, Beth Juvik are inviting members across the state to join in by constructing blocks for this project.


The quilt pattern features scenes from a rustic Pacific Northwest forest, including many trees as well as animals found in Federation Forest. The block construction technique is applique with a straight stitch just inside the edge of each appliqued piece. There are no pieced blocks. Finished size of the quilt will be approximately 48" x 68" and it will be displayed on the wall of the Catherine Montgomery Interpretive Center to the left of the merchandise display case. It's to your right as you come in the door. The rest rooms are on the other side of the wall.

Stop by the table set up at Fall Board to see an example of the blocks as well as one completed row. Char Lysne, Federation Forest Committee member, will coordinate the distribution of the fabrics and patterns for those interested in constructing a block or two and will have them available at Fall Board if you would like to help. Completed blocks will be returned to her as she is assembling the quilt top.

GFWC Cathlamet Woman's Club



We were among the first to see the museum's redesign, as well as touring the Gathering Place at Washuxwal pavilion featuring carvings by La Center artist Adam McIsaac. The pavilion, is modeled after Native American cedar plank houses of the 1800s.

"What we wanted to do was to bring the Native American history into our museum along with the pioneer history," Cobb said, adding that he looks forward to welcoming tour groups and schoolchildren to the Gathering Place for programming and lectures about local Native American history.

GFWC Camas-Washougal

GFWC C-W continues to provide meals to members of the communities of Camas and Washougal two times per quarter, My 21 and June 30. At each of these events we provided 75 meals to members of our community, Washougal Washington.

Refuel Washougal is a community-supported weekly free meal that demonstrates Washougal's commitment to residents who are experiencing hard times. The mission of Refuel Washougal is this:



"To comfort our community by providing a warm meal to those in need."

Since Jan. 2, 2015, churches, schools, community groups and individuals have provided a meal and fellowship in a welcoming setting. About 50 people attend each Friday, including people experiencing homelessness, teenagers, families, seniors and others who may be hungry, isolated or lonely. ReFuel Washougal volunteers supplement the meal.

GFWC Camas-Washougal

In 2017 GFWC C-W applied for a grant from the Camas Washougal Community Chest and The Reach For the Stars Through Books program was created.

In 2020 a secondary umbrella was created so that we could provide books to ALL children enrolled in Pre-K programs in the Washougal School District.

In 2021 GFWC C-W received enough funding from the Camas Washougal Community Chest so that we could provide books to all children enrolled in Pre-K programs in the Washougal AND Camas School District.

Pre-K books are distributed to the children enrolled in *Reach for the Stars Through Books* expands by including Pre-K Reading Program

Due to the generosity of the Camas-Washougal Community Chest the GFWC (General Federation of Women's Clubs) Camas-Washougal was able to grow our current *Reach For The Stars Through Books* program at Hathaway Elementary School to include all of the Preschool programs offered through the Washougal and Camas School Districts.

Those five programs are:

Washougal School District kindergarten classes EOCF (HeadStart) Ready, Set, Kindergarten Washougal School District Developmental ECEAP Childcare/Preschool

Summer Learning, Summer Fun!

- Washougal School District, June 22, 2021

With a generous Community Chest grant and donations from The General Federation of Women's Clubs Camas-Washougal (GFWC-CW), Washougal School District Early Learning is able to provide "Summer Learning, Summer Fun" packets to pre-K students entering kindergarten the fall of 2021.



These packets include a "Get Ready for Kindergarten" workbook, 2 new books, and "Kindergarten Readiness Guidelines" for parents.

The workbook is filled with skill areas such as letters, numbers, reading, writing, and math. If the workbook is completed before the first day of school on August 31st, the student will receive an additional 3 new books.

The two books in the packet - "Kindness to Share from A to Z" and "Me and My Amazing Body" - support social/emotional learning and the intrigue of science.

The "Kindergarten Readiness Guidelines" outline the various skills a student should have when entering kindergarten to support their success. The guidelines encompass physical, social/emotional, language, literacy, math, and cognitive skills. Parents can indicate if "Yes, my child can do this." or "We are working on this.". It provides a template for parents as they prepare their students for a smooth and confident transition to kindergarten.

At the end of the school year, Washougal pre-K students in the Washougal Community Education Preschools, ECEAP, and EOCF (Head Start) programs received packets at their preschool graduation. Outreach continues so all pre-K families have the opportunity to participate in this summer learning. Over 125 packets are planned for distribution.

"Our goal is to reach every Washougal student that will benefit from this summer learning packet", according to Lisa Young, Washougal School District Extended Learning Manager. "The generosity of the Community Chest and GFWC-CW is unparalleled. They fully understand the importance of ongoing learning opportunities for our youngest learners. As a community, we are fortunate to benefit from their sustained care and commitment of resources to education".

GFWC Kitsap Peninsula Woman's Club

Neither rain, nor 40 mile an hour winds, nor cold temperatures could stop the GFWC Kitsap Peninsula Woman's Club from our Fundraising Rummage Sale at the Kitsap Tractor and Swap meet this June.

One member is a member of the Tractor Club, who granted us free use of a spot. Five members plus 2 husbands set up Friday and helped price items to be sold. On Saturday the fun began. A member lent us a canopy covering, which we put over our tables of merchandise only to have it start to lift off into the air with the winds. 
