

The new team set goals and reviewed what has worked and what has not. In addition, new officers created a strategic plan and a succession plan with roadmap, timeline, and leadership development opportunities with prospective club presidential candidates to help them prepare for the role of president."

The countdown is on to LEADS application submittals. Remember, the due date for applications is early, **December 15**! Talk to your members who show an interest, encourage them to grow by considering the opportunity. Is YOUR application complete? Nature's Best Hope

Autumn is here and once again trees are so important. Yard clean up is on the to-do list—don't do it. Insects need the ground leaves and fading plants to support larvae, eggs, and other life stages during the winter. They stay warm and more importantly hidden. Also birds and mammals look for food throughout the winter and these "sleeping" insects are an invaluable food resource. If you can stand having a messy yard, according to a Baltimore butterfly garden specialist, yard clean up should not be started until temperatures are consistently above 55. Of course, a blanket of fallen leaves offers plants some protection from winter cold and freezing. And leaves provide free fertilizer and mulch.

Don't trim your trees either. Tree seeds, fruit, and nuts left on the branches provide food all winter for birds and mammals. And in early spring they are a source of nesting material. Tress also hide insects in their bark, another source of winter food. All trees provide protection against predators and if the tree is evergreen, a haven.

Lastly, start thinking about spring plantings opportunities. Native plant sales, conservation districts and local nurseries will start advertising native trees and bushes for sale starting in February. And don't forget my challenge, each club plant 2 native trees over the next 2 years. It is nature's best hope.

Spotlight tree—Ocean Spray

Part sun, dry rocky soil, 15 feet tall, deciduous
Blooms June to August with white flowers in the shape of a plume
Fall seeds
Flowers attract hummingbirds, butterflies, bees, insects
Seeds attract, bushtits, chickadees, woodpeckers, crows, jays, sparrows

Grows in both eastern and western Washington

Human Trafficking – Ideas by Diana Glaze -GFWC South Central Region Representative


Human trafficking crimes affect 14,500 to 17,500 victims annually across the United States. All cities are affected by this crime. Clubs can be vital in educating your community about this problem.

Here are some things you can do that were suggested by the GFWC Chairman:

- Make information cards to be placed in vehicles so people can recognize signs of human trafficking.
- Put large posters with resources for help placed in gas stations restrooms. Install signs in public restrooms and in other public places.
- Make wallet size cards that include details on what to look for and how to report it.
- Place signs in public restrooms in roadside areas and travel information centers.
- Partnership with other agencies in your community.



The Women Who Dreamt of Preservation

Scott Eilrich

Park Ranger 1 Federation Forest State Park

It is a cool autumn morning in the old growth forest at Federation Forest State Park. Rolling down from the surrounding mountain ranges a thick blanket of fog encroaches. Green turns to yellow in the pines as autumn approaches. Pine needles are raining down

from the towering coniferous old growth giants blanketing each side of the walkways leading to the Catherine Montgomery Interpretive Center. As we enter the Interpretive Center, a large information board is spotted detailing the story of the women, history, and founding of Federation Forest State Park.

At present day, the General Federation of Women's Clubs-Washington State has made a recent prolific donation towards beautification of the Federation Forest entrance sign.

"The members of General Federation of Women's Clubs – Washington State deeply appreciate the park staff who care for Federation Forest State Park. Without a doubt, the prescient Clubwomen of the 1920s who saw a need to preserve old growth forest and donated the land for the first location of the park would be pleased to know that future generations continue to be able to walk among the gentle giants as was their intent at the time of their gift."

From its earliest days, members of the Washington State Federation of Women's Clubs (the predecessor of GFWC-WS) have understood the importance of preserving natural resources. Minutes from a meeting in 1898 reflect that importance; one of the founders pleaded "for the preservation of forests because they purify the air and water, modify climate, prevent freshets and keep up supplies for springs". Women of the GFWC-WS have a lengthy recorded history of contributing prolific monetary donations, and hosting fundraisers to Federation Forest State Park. They take a personal interest in park maintenance as well and host an annual "clean up" party at the Catherine Montgomery Interpretive Center and vicinity.

In the mid 1920s a teacher at Everett High School, Jean Caithness Greenlees, had a dream of preserving old growth forest, and initiated an effort to preserve a tract of old growth forest for use as a park. Greenlees presented her idea to Esther Maltby, president of the Washington State chapter of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and together they launched the "Save a tree" campaign in 1926. Donors purchased pins for \$1 and "trees" for \$100. Today, a bronze plaque is dedicated with the names in the park's upper picnic area. "Save a Tree" pins are currently being sold at the Catherine Montgomery Interpretive Center. Two years later, the fundraiser was successfully completed, and the vison and dream of Jean Caithness Greenlees was a reality. The name "Federation Forest" was chosen to honor the work of the GFWC-WS.

Aa decade later in 1938, a turbulent windstorm devasted Federation Forest State Park and it was condemned as a safety hazard, initiating an effort to find a new location for the park. On January 16th, 1941, the deed to an old growth tract of land along the White River was transferred from the White River Lumber Company to Washington State Parks. This tract of land would expand over the next few years. On July 16th, 1949, the present-day location of Federation Forest State Park was dedicated.

Almost a decade later in 1958, Catherine Montgomery, a member of Washington State Federation Women's Clubs and pioneer educator had dreamt of preservation, and lived a life exploring, left an enormous sum of her estate for interpretation at Federation Forest. On August 20th, 1964, the Catherine Montgomery Interpretive Center was completed and dedicated in her honor.

Meanwhile, inside the park, renovations are underway in the restroom building near the parking lot. It has been closed for a number of years due to weather related damage and time.

Closed for the winter, the park will reopen around April 1.



The Woman's Club of Olympia (WCO) was formed when nine like-minded women got together in 1883 to form a woman's club for self-improvement. WCO has digitized most of their records from their beginnings. A favorite history paper that we've read during Women's History month, was written by one of the Mercer girls who came from Boston in a ship down around Cape Horn to California, up to Seattle and then down to Olympia in a covered wagon. These were brave women who wanted to make a difference!

Woman's Club of Olympia will be celebrating our 140th Anniversary on March 10, 2023. We hope you will come and join us for this outstanding accomplishment.

NATIONAL WORLD WAR II FLIGHT MUSEUM

I flew into New Orleans on June 22, 2022. I registered at the hotel that afternoon and the next morning joined the tour to The National World War II Museum.

I was not aware that the only official National World War II Museum is in New Orleans. I had signed up for that tour because I thought my husband Jerry would enjoy it. When he was unable to join me going to New Orleans, I decided, oh well I might as well go myself.

When I walked in the doors of the museum, the first thing I saw was this huge airplane hanging from the ceiling. I was told it was an airplane actually flown in World War II. There was also a fighter plane with teeth. (See pictures).

As I wandered through the museum, I am sure I only saw half of what was there in the short time we were allowed. There were areas set up to show various parts of the war, movies from the time of the war, probably newsreels from the 1940s, and you could constantly hear personal stories.

There were cars donated to the museum, guns, uniforms, pictures and a plethora of other items.

My own father enlisted December 7, 1941 after Pearl Harbor was bombed and wrote letters to his father during his enlistment. One of those letters was written the day his battalion arrived in Dachau, Germany. He described some of the conditions as they were the first American battalion to arrive in Dachau. I could only read that letter once. I still have those letters and his uniforms and if we are able, plan on taking those items back to the museum next year.

If any of you have items from WWII from a family member who may have been part of that terrible time, you might contact the museum to donate in their name.
