Parliamentary Procedure

Why Parliamentary Law? Nancy Jones, Parliamentary Authority Adapted from Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised 12th Edition

The rules of parliamentary law are written on a careful balance of the rights of persons or subgroups within an organization's or an assembly's total membership. These rules are based on a concern for the rights:

- of the majority,
- of the minority, especially a strong minority (greater than one third),
- of individual members,
- of absentees, and
- of all these together.

The ways of protecting all of these rights in appropriate form, is much of the body of parliamentary law. The need for these protections commands the constant revisions the laws have undergone over the years.

Parliamentary procedure enables the overall membership of an organization to express its resolve, while empowering its leadership as it sees fit to allow. The overall membership keeps the direct control over its business that it chooses to reserve for itself. It is the majority of members taking part in the meeting who decide the general outcome, but only after the opportunity for a process of full and free discussion. Only two thirds or more of members present and voting may deny a minority or any member the right of such discussion.

Each individual or subgroup has the right to make the maximum effort to have their position discussed and declared the will of the assembly, to the extent it can be accepted by the interest of the entire body. This is why there are usually time limits placed on speakers during the presentations of bylaws and resolutions, for example.

Another important principle is that of a protection against instability. This could come from a slight difference in attendance; the requirements for changing an earlier action are greater than those needed for taking the action in the first place.

The application of parliamentary law is the best method developed to allow an organization or group of any size, while protecting every member's opinion, to achieve the general consensus on a wide variety of questions of different difficulty in a minimum amount of time. This also helps work through internal environment ranging from total harmony to hardened or emotional division of opinion.

The use of Parliamentary Law is the most useful tool in any leaders briefcase. Know the basics and you will get through any meeting you need to chair. The 12th Edition of Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised was published last year. Make sure your club has a copy to share with your officers.

Registration is now open for this year's International Convention in New Orleans, LA!


The Early Bird package discount ends April 30 so if you are at all considering going, don't wait too long to get registered!

Click on *Resources*


Click on "C"

You can download any edition of magazine, or the cookbook, on your computer and look at it later.














Federation Forest



It's a FOREST WORK DAY Saturday May 14, 2022 10am-2pm



Look forward and plan to spend the day in the Forest! Come out to our beautiful forest and help get the interpretive gardens and trail signs ready for visitors! We will be weeding and spreading mulch in the garden beds, cleaning off the trail signs on the interpretive trail near the center and possibly other light tasks. A guided walk through the forest, after lunch, will wrap up the day.

Things to know for the day:

- Breakfast treats, coffee and other beverages will be provided along with food-handler's gloves to serve them.
- No need to pack a lunch, as that too, will be provided.
- Bring hand gardening tools and gloves if you wish.

Directions:

From the North, take SR 167 southbound. Follow 167 a little less than 20 miles to Highway 410 East. Or from the Olympia/Tacoma area, take SR 512 East to SR 410 East. Once on Highway 410, continue to Enumclaw, approximately 15 miles. Remain on highway 410 through Enumclaw. The park is located 15 miles east of Enumclaw on Route 410 about 30 miles below the summit of Chinook Pass.

Around milepost 41, watch for a sign on the right side of the road when the Federation Forest State Park property begins. (For those of you who have been to the park before, the sign is new—the old log sign rotted and was replaced with a fiberglass one.) Continue past that sign until you see a sign for Interpretive Center, also on the right side of the roadway. Shortly past the interpretive Center sign is a mailbox on the right at the park entrance. Proceed into the park property and park in designated parking areas. Because we are volunteers working at the park, no Discover Pass is needed.

Collecting gift cards and socks for the foster care system (District). 3 members volunteered on a Sat. in Dec. to shop for kids in local schools. food and money. For fun we attend their dinner/auction. This year we put together 2 baskets with homemade quilts and handmade sweaters, stuffed animals +. We still volunteer at My Sisters Pantry distributing food. Feel lucky to do some inside events.

Our Nov./Dec. fundraiser gave us over \$2500 – selling carwash tickets.



Woman's Club of Olympia











Club 8 is an afternoon school program that is comprised of the two middle schools here in Washougal. Jemtegaard and Canyon Creek.


GFWC Elahan



402. Breast Cancer Examination. The Resolutions Committee proposes the addition of the word ultrasounds after mammograms.

If approved would read: RESOLVED, That GFWC – Washington State actively engages in cancer detection programs by acquainting members with techniques for self-examination and the need for regular physical examination by a physician and mammograms, ultrasounds or MRI's if needed; and further

- **403. Gerontology.** The Resolutions Committee proposes the addition of a new resolved. RESOLVED, that GFWC Washington State urges doctors to be aware of the need of aging special needs individuals and elderly persons with memory issues to prevent elder abuse and fraud.
- **407. Colorectal Cancer Awareness.** The Resolutions Committee proposes to delete the second WHEREAS and insert a new second WHEREAS to read WHEREAS, Cologuard is a non-invasive test and a positive result may indicate the presence of colorectal cancer and should be followed up with a diagnostic colonoscopy.

The committee also proposes to insert the words cologuard tests after regular In the first RESOLVED.

If approved would read: RESOLVED, that GFWC-Washington State strongly encourages everyone over 50 to follow their physician's advice as to when to schedule regular cologuard tests and colonoscopies, and further

408. Skin Cancer Awareness and Prevention. The Resolutions Committee proposes to add a 6 and 7 following 5 in the first RESOLVED. If approved would read RESOLVED, that GFWC – Washington State member protect their families by:

- 1, Applying water-resistant sunscreen
- 2. Wearing appropriate protective clothing
- 3. Seeking shade when appropriate
- 4. Using extra caution near water, snow and sand
- 5. Avoid tanning beds and sunburn
- 6. Schedule regular yearly checkups by a qualified Dermatologist
- 7. Check the side effects of medications because some blood pressure medications are known to increase the chances of getting skin cancer.

The Resolutions Committee proposes the following resolutions in the Health and Wellness Program remain unchanged: Resolutions 404 Social Security; 405 Strengthening Family Responsibility; 406 Strengthening Family Unity; 409. Bicycle Helmets; 410 Affirmation of Faith; 411 Breast Cancer; 412 Child Foster Care; 413 Diabetes; 414 Economic Equity; and 415 Gynecologic Cancer.

Resolutions in the Civic Engagement and Outreach program will be reviewed in the next administration.
