
Did you take “the perfect photograph” in 2022?

I did not know this existed until it was brought to my attention by our President Susan after she saw it on a You Tube video from the White House Christmas. Operation Gratitude proudly delivers care packages to deployed troops, first responders, military families, recruit graduates, veterans, wounded heroes and caregivers. Care packages can be requested to be sent by Operation Gratitude to all of these people. There are many ways to show our gratitude by donating, volunteering, sending items to fill care boxes. Volunteers and donors provide care packages to thank all who serve.

Volunteers also can serve by writing letters and cards to show support. Thousands of handwritten letters and cards of appreciation, love, and support to military, frontline responders, graduates, veterans, wounded, and caregivers are very much appreciated.

Ways of donating are by products, matching gifts, legacy giving, and qualified charitable distribution and stock donations.

A little history—in March of 2003 Operation Gratitude sent its first four care packages to deployed service members in Iraq. Since its inception, the organization has provided opportunities for thousands of Americans to express their gratitude through hands-on volunteerism, lifting the spirits of those who raise their hands to serve. Let us, along with other Americans, say, “Thank you”.

We would like clubs to collect items from the following list to make up care boxes for Operation Gratitude. A lot of items can be handmade and can fill member’s time over the next few months. It is my idea that **clubs take their items to their Fall District Conferences for collection**. In turn, we will send them on to Operation Gratitude which is located in Chatsworth, California. Nature's Best Hope

Spring is close and our environmental thoughts turn to spring planting. Native plant and tree sales are advertising a huge variety of available native trees. To get guaranteed native plants, your best bet is native plant society sales or locally owned shops where the staff is generally knowledgeable about how to grow Washington natives. And when choosing your plants remember our native wildlife, and look for native plants that produce seeds, nuts or fruit. They will provide interest in your yard year round.

Two very important days are coming up to celebrate and volunteer for our environment. First is Earth Day on Saturday April 22, followed closely by Arbor Day on Friday, April 28th. Earth Day came about because of a massive oil spill in California. The day continues to be supported by the Earth Day Network to remind everyone worldwide, of the importance of being aware and supportive of the world's environment. Arbor Day started in January 1872, when a Nebraska newspaper editor proposed a tree planting holiday to the Nebraska Board of Agriculture. The idea became reality on April 10, of that year and Arbor Day was born with the goal of encouraging people to plant trees.

Both days are widely celebrated in Washington. Please check out local opportunities to get involved and volunteer for the environment. **And don't forget the challenge of planting 2 native trees during Susan's presidency. So far Chambers Bay and Avalon have completed the challenge.**

Snowberry –

- 3-5 ft shrub that can get straggly, needs sun to partial shade, deciduous
- Blooms late spring or early summer, small white-pinkish tubular flower
- White berries fall through summer (important winter food for birds)
- Flowers attract Hummingbirds, butterflies, and bees
- Host plant for moth
- Berries attract robins, waxwings, grosbeaks, towhees, and thrushes
- Grows on both sides of the Cascades
- All parts of plant toxic to humans.

Volunteering to help child advocacy is a great way to make a difference in the lives of vulnerable children and families. Whether it's helping children in foster care, refugee children, homeless families or those suffering from poverty, volunteering can be a powerful act of compassion and kindness. Volunteering can involve anything from providing legal assistance to families to mentoring young people in need.

No matter how you choose to help, your volunteering efforts have an important impact on the lives of these children and their families. Here are some ways that you can get involved:

- **Local Childcare Centers:** Offer your time at local childcare centers to provide support for children and staff members. You may be able to help with administration, feeding time, playtime or even teaching basic lessons.
- **Refugee Outreach Programs:** If there are any refugee outreach programs near where you live, consider getting involved as a volunteer. Refugees are often fleeing difficult circumstances, so having somebody on hand to provide support can be invaluable in building up trust and encouraging resettlement into the community.
- **Foster Care Agencies:** Contact your local foster care agency and inquire about volunteer opportunities such as tutoring or recreational activities for kids who have been placed into foster homes.

Donate Your Time to Campaigns: Local advocacy campaigns could benefit immensely from your valuable donations of time and energy if you're passionate about campaigning for more resources and better protection for children around the world.

No matter how much time or effort you put into volunteering; each contribution towards helping vulnerable children makes positive change possible!



Woman's Club Spokane cosponsored an Afghani craft bazaar and dinner to benefit the Mahima Project of Refugee and Immigrant Connections Spokane (RICS) on December 7. In addition to its contributions to the bazaar, the club supports the project by providing club space for beading classes led by Arianna Brooke, owner of Millianna Jewelry. When the women achieve beading proficiency, Arianna pays the class members for their work. The beading work is done in a culturally sensitive setting for the women while providing them with a way to make money and connect socially with other Afghani women.

The bazaar featured Millianna jewelry, traditional Afghani clothing embroidered by project members, henna art and an Afghani food buffet. The bazaar also allowed the Afghani women to celebrate their achievements since joining the project.

Pingala Dhital, Mahima Project director and WCS member, moved the project to Thrive International <https://thriveint.org> on January 1st to become a part of their women's empowerment program. WCS continues its primary service goal to support refugee and immigrant women for 2023.

—Proposed changes to resolutions for consideration at State Convention—

Proposed additions are noted in **[bold blue text and surrounded by brackets]**. Proposed deletions are noted in *strikethrough italic text*.

Regarding the resolution which was referred back to committee:

506. Colorectal Cancer Awareness.

(Adopted 2008, Reaffirmed 2012, Amended 2016)

WHEREAS, Colon Cancer has now been declared the third cause of death among both men and women in the United States, and

WHEREAS, Colonoscopy is currently the best means of early detection of colon cancer; therefore

[WHEREAS, The American Cancer Society recommends that people commence regular screening for Colorectal Cancer at the age of 45, or younger if they have a family history of colon cancer.]

RESOLVED, that GFWC-Washington State strongly encourages everyone ~~over 50~~ to follow their physician's advice as to when to schedule regular *colonoscopies* **[colorectal cancer tests]**, and further

RESOLVED, that GFWC-Washington State urges its members to participate in funding further research.

In the Civic Engagement and Outreach Program:

205. ~~Crime Prevention Councils.~~ [Crime Prevention Associations].

(Adopted 1972, Reaffirmed 1994, 1998, 2007, 2014)

WHEREAS, Crime in the United States continues to be a serious problem; and

WHEREAS, The citizens of every community have a responsibility to assist their local law enforcement agencies in a program of crime prevention; and

WHEREAS, Cooperation between those serving the public welfare and those whom they serve will create an atmosphere in which all are working together to solve the problems of crime which now exist; therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC-Washington State urges member clubs to work in cooperation with other groups and organizations to establish *Crime Prevention Councils* [**Crime Prevention Associations**] where none now exist; and further

RESOLVED, That the members of GFWC-Washington State show their civic responsibility by supporting *and serving on established Crime Prevention Councils* [**and joining established Crime Prevention Associations**].

Rationale: Washington State does not have Crime Prevention Councils but does have Crime Prevention Associations.

212. Drug Abuse.

(Adopted 1925, 1928, 1929, 1930, 1933, 1939, 1970, Reaffirmed 1994, 1998, Revised 2002, Amended 2007. 2014)

The Resolutions Committee proposes to delete the second WHEREAS and the third RESOLVED.

Rationale: Both of these deal with the study and classification of cannabis. Cannabis is now legal in Washington State so the classification has changed.

215. Enforcement of Cigarette[, Vapor Products] and Marijuana Laws.

(Adopted 1909, 1912, Revised 1994, Reaffirmed 1998, 2002, 2007, Rescinded and replaced 2015)

WHEREAS, Washington State law prohibits the sale *or use of cigarettes and other tobacco by* [**of cigarettes and vapor products to**] minors, under the age of *eighteen* [**twenty-one**], and

WHEREAS, Washington State law prohibits the sale of recreational and medical marijuana to persons under the age of twenty-one, and

WHEREAS, the sale of cigarettes [, vapor] and marijuana products to persons under the legal as stated in the laws of Washington State carries stiff penalties and fines, therefore

RESOLVED, That GFWC-Washington State members encourage strict enforcement of the laws covering the sale of cigarettes [, vapor] and marijuana to underage persons within their respective communities for the health and well-being of the youth of our state.

Rationale: To update

217. Human trafficking

(Adopted 2016)

WHEREAS, According to the U.S. Department of State:

- Human trafficking is a modern form of slavery, involving victims who are typically forced, defrauded or coerced into sexual and/or labor exploitations; and
- Human trafficking is one of the fastest growing criminal activities globally, and
- ~~Annually, over 700,000 people, mostly women and children, are trafficked worldwide, including over 50000 persons in the United States; therefore~~
[24.9 million people are victims of forced labor. Of this number, 4.8 million people are trafficked for forced sexual exploitation.]
